OPENING REMARKS

During the three day workshop, we will have technical presentations from our resource speakers, economy reports from our APEC colleagues, parallel workshops and market interaction, all focusing on strategic mainstreaming of climate change adaptation and

mitigation in agriculture across policy instruments (research and development, extension, regulations) and viable and sustainable partnerships on climate change adaptation and mitigation. We will have a field trip to the International Research Institute (IRRI) on third day, October 24, to visit actual programs and facilities on climate change adaptation and mitigation in agriculture.

Through your active participation, we look forward to insightful sessions and interactions which we hope could lead to sustained partnerships and networking with one another to pursue our primary objective, a climate resilient agriculture sector to achieve food security effects of climate change.

Workshop Overview, Objectives and Expected Output

During the next three days, we hope that we learn from each other's experiences how our respective economies are addressing CC in agriculture so that on the third day, we can agree on a framework of cooperation as regards the APEC Adaptation and Mitigation Initiative in Agriculture or AAMIA. We are interested to create viable and sustainable partnership arrangements among APEC economies and partner institutions to support institutionalization and implementation of AMIA. In other words, we want to achieve synergy of efforts among APEC economies so that adaptation and mitigation of CC in agriculture becomes an economy-wide practice with solid results both at the level of the levels of the economy and world-wide.

On the part of the Philippines, its central strategy is mainstreaming AMIA across policy instruments and agencies in the whole agriculture bureaucracy. The current experiences of the Philippines will be the subject of most technical papers. On the other hand, the economy presentations and subsequent parallel workshops have been designed to focus on the three major policy instruments of agriculture development: research and development or R&D, information, communication, and extension (ICE) and agricultural regulations (AR).
